

Reform and Innovation Capacity of the German Health Care System

- although the German health care system is currently characterized by great reform activity under Minister Jens Spahn, far-reaching structural changes are rare due to the large number of actors and especially the strong role of self-administration
- the main objective of this research is to analyze the factors that hinder or enable success of major policy reforms
- various currently discussed reform proposals are reviewed against the backdrop of actor positions, constellations, and reform blockades
- final recommendations regarding the 2021 general election: which proposals promise to be successful and in what way can they be realized?
